From supporting our Summer Learning program to sorting and processing donated books, the work you do is vital to the Library's success.

We've recently wrapped up our Winter Reading program and are looking forward to a 2023 full of amazing programs and events. Nevada County Reads is right around the corner and, before you know it, we'll be into Summer Learning.

The Madelyn Helling Library served as an overnight warming shelter multiple times during December. In partnership with Sierra Roots and the County of Nevada, the library opens its door to our homeless community members when certain weather thresholds are met. I'm incredibly proud that we are able to serve in this way. Folks receive a hot meal, warm place to sleep, and the comfort of not being out in the cold, rain, and snow.

Construction on our new Bear River location has begun! Slated to open in late summer, the new Bear River library is a million-dollar project located in the Lake of the Pines shopping plaza. The facility is approximately 2,600 square feet and is modeled on our Penn Valley location. Exciting features include a dedicated children's area, community conference room, and ample programming space.

We're very excited for 2023's Nevada County Reads. This year's book is Interior Chinatown by Charles Yu. In addition to book groups and other related events, Mr. Yu will visit us for an event at the Miner's Foundry in May. This event is a great way for our county to come together over our shared love of books and community. I'm looking forward to seeing all of you there!

Nevada County Library is always looking for new and innovative ways to serve our community and we rely on the support of the Friends of the Nevada County Libraries to do our best work. Thank you for everything you've done for the library and our community over the past year. I look forward to seeing what we accomplish together in 2023!




Doris Foley Library Update

With support of the Nevada County Resiliency grant, we continued our robust roster of weekly programs, including Minecraft Club, Guitar for Teens, Arts and Crafts, Spanish, Toddler Singing and Ukulele class, and a Dungeons and Dragons gaming night.

In October, we celebrated the season with Halloween craft day where we made all sorts of spooky stuff! We also introduced a two-week workshop, "Steps to Death" where participants learn strategies for end of life situations: wills, aftercare, health directives, etc. We will periodically be offering this workshop 2 to 3 times a year. November was a stellar month as we received a grant from Quality Counts California, a state program aimed at ages 0-5, but widely applicable to our programs. We intend to create a puppet theatre program with the monies, and are currently contracting with a local craftsman and researching puppets! We also added leather working to our roster. So exciting! December was fun with lots of holiday crafting for our Arts and Crafts! Barbara Jones, Alicia Lauder, Nichole DaLuz Ginger Wilson, Karina Williams, Renee Renoir and other community members made our Holiday Craft Extravaganza and Annual Cookie Exchange such a blast!

As we move into the winter months, we are creating a cozy space for people to escape to with our ongoing tapestry project and a puzzle. By continuing to be innovative, we are redefining what people think of when they think "library"! Thank you Friends for all your support!

We are delighted to update yet another computer station, continue our thriving programs, and keep our community literate and connected! In January, we added a class, Qi Gong, for senior movement (though everyone is welcome) and we hope to offer the "Steps to Death" workshop again February. Also in February, we do a Valentine Craft Extravaganza where we make cards and treats for those we love.

It is my intention to have ongoing, annual events that folks can rely upon. We have already established great ones, such as Kite Day and the Dog Parade. I would like to see the craft extravaganzas and puppet shows gain the same notoriety as those, while continuing to offer educational programs such as Spanish and computing. This Winter in Youth Services, we created a fun and simple Winter Reading Challenge: play bingo, win a book. Youth ages o-18 could pick up a Winter Reading Bingo card from any branch, complete five activities in a row to get a bingo, and then redeem the card for a free book. Patrons were excited to participate and loved the challenge. So far, we've had a 47% rate of return on the bingo cards!

We kicked off Winter Reading with an interactive storywalk around downtown Grass Valley featuring Michael Genhart's beautiful and touching picture book, May Your Life Be Deliciosa, which is inspired by the author's family and features the Mexican tradition of holiday tamale-making. The storywalk led participants from the Children's Room at Grass Valley Library around downtown as they read the book one page at a time in different business windows. As always the businesses were happy to participate and we got a lot of positive feedback from families who enjoyed the story and the walk!

We had over 120 Nevada and Placer County students participate in a Virtual Author Talk with the author of May Your Life Be Deliciosa, wherein Michael Genhart discussed his inspiration for the book and his process of creating it with the illustrator, Lora Loris, who was honored as the 2022 Pura Belpré Award Illustrator for her work on the book. He also encouraged the kids to share their own stories and write them down! Kids came with pre-prepared questions, which the author graciously answered in a Q&A at the end.

To cap off Winter Reading we organized a puppet show at Madelyn Helling Library with Puppet Art Theater out of Sacramento. They performed Jack and the Beanstalk and gave a behind the scenes look at puppetry after the show! Take home puppet kits made by Grass Valley and Madelyn Helling staff will be available while supplies last.


We have a wonderful, creative, and collaborative Youth Services team and are so excited to share our love of reading with the community!

To complement our winter theme, we invited our young patrons to make snowflakes and other wintery items to add to our winter scene, below the heading, "Snow Many Books, Snow Little Time!"
